INSET DAY

CURRICULUM - PHONICS

Over the last two years, our staff have worked incredibly hard in their delivery of phonic lessons, but also with their keep up and catch up groups too. This takes a lot of time and preparation on top of the delivery time; however, it has proven to have significant benefits on the children's phonic ability. Last year 93.5% of our Year 1 children passed the phonic screening test.

In Reception:

This term, your child has been taught phonics for 10–15 minutes every day.

- They have learnt to say and read all the single letter sounds (for example, s and m) and some consonant digraphs. A digraph is where two letters make one sound (for example qu and sh).
- · We have worked really hard to teach your child to blend sounds together to read words.

If your child has found any of this tricky and has any gaps in their learning, it would be really helpful to practice these with them at home too to ensure they don't fall behind.

<u>In Year 1</u>, children are taught a 30-minute phonics lesson every day. They will continue to read longer, more complex words, applying all sounds that they have been taught. Further information about their curriculum can be found on our school website.

ORACY

Last year we continued our journey to support language acquisition and confidence. We do this by speaking through the implementation of oracy assemblies every week. This has become a favourite part of the children's school day!

The children learn stories, poems and rhymes off by heart and are building confidence to recite them to larger audiences.

MAKATON

You will have noticed that we have been sending out notifications on MCAS, sharing our weekly Makaton sign with you.

Your children will be learning one sign a week to help them communicate with some of our children in school that use this as their primary means of communication.

READING PRACTICE

Our reading practice sessions support our phonic scheme and enable the children to practice and apply using the sounds they have been taught. It is important that the children are only accessing books with sounds that they have been exposed to ensure that they feel confident in their own reading successes.

Every day, all of our children participate in a reading practice group – there are three important elements to every week:

Decoding ----> Prosody ----> Comprehension

In Reception this term, children are:

• Starting to read wordless books and, when they can blend sounds into words, will be reading Phase 2 books.

We want children to be able to read fluently and not find reading a chore. Once they can read fluently, they can focus on adding expression when reading aloud and showing their understanding of the book.

Use the prompts on the back page of the books to check your child's understanding.

It is important that your child is not rushed through the scheme – repeated practice is essential.

Developing on the success in the implementation of phonics and reading practice, we have purchased new Little Wandle Fluency books for Year 2 children.

Little Wandle Fluency teaches all aspects of reading using vibrant, diverse and engaging chapter books created by contemporary authors and illustrators. Each book has been carefully devised to support children as they progress in reading fluency; making sure every child can become a confident, fluent and motivated reader.

Little Wandle Fluency is for children who have completed Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised) programme and are secure at reading the final level of books. It is not for children who still need phonics instruction.







What can I do to support my child at home?

- Ask them what sounds they have learned each day and point out objects in the environment or in books that start with that sound.
- Read to your child daily choose books that you can enjoy together. The love of reading books we send home are a great place to start!
- Listen to them practise reading their phonics book to develop their fluency.
- Ask your child's teacher if you need extra help with supporting your child that's what we're here for!

Our school curriculum is planned in a progressive way, which means that where a child missed a lesson, this will need to be caught up at a different time to prevent gaps in learning. With such a busy school day, it is incredibly difficult to be able to teach a lesson again – where this happens, another child misses out on their catch up.
